COMMUNITY COUNCIL REFLECTIONS

Last month, our community lost three beloved members: Betty Shively, Arlene Clifford, and Chris Burner. Every time friends from our community die, we mourn their loss, but losing three beloved members at one time is a stunning blow. Although I thought I knew Betty, Arlene, and Chris, I learned much more about them from their obituaries, which all appeared in the Portland Press Herald on the same day. Last year, at age 101, Betty was declared the oldest female citizen of the Town of Falmouth and, as such, became the 33rd recipient of the Falmouth Boston Post Cane. Honoring a town's oldest residents in this way is a tradition that began in 1909 and is celebrated in hundreds of New England towns. We will miss Betty, who could always be counted on to lend a helping hand at the OceanView Library and holiday craft fairs.

Arlene, who died at age 98, was an active volunteer for the Red Cross for 50 years. She served as a Presidential disaster volunteer, helping people to recover from Midwest floods, California earthquakes, southern tornadoes, Maine ice storms, and the devastation of 9/11 in New York City. Until her death, Arlene stayed involved in local and national politics. As her obituary stated, "Nothing held her back from sending a well-crafted letter voicing her opinions." We will miss her dry wit and wisdom.

OV LIBRARY COMMITTEE FROM THE NEW BOOK SHELF

FICTION: Anne Enright's *The Wren, the Wren,* described as incandescent, follows the lives of three generations of Irish women. Enright won the Booker Prize for a previous novel. We now have the most recent novels by Kate Christensen, Louise Erdrich, John Grisham, and from Richard Russo, *Somebody's Fool*. Always popular mysteries have been added this month plus a thriller by Ruth Ware, who is already well represented in our collection.

NONFICTION: Have you recently noticed the popularity of books that address what humans might learn from our plant and animal companions on the planet? Here's another: Jackie Higgins has written *Sentient*, subtitled "How Animals Illuminate the Wonder of our Human Senses."

In general, the library committee is reticent to accept "How To" books. Here's an exception, Eighty Somethings: a Practical Guide. Author Katharine Esty offers guidance on the many issues that we 80-yearolds encounter and navigate. It's advice with a light touch and humor. Not so humorous is Oath and Honor by Liz Cheney, her account of the actions and aftermath of January 6, 2021. An addition to the **biography** shelf is *Lion of Liberty: Patrick Henry*. We have two new additions to the MAINE collection. Wildflowers of Casco Bay is by the three Radis brothers. A memoir about his island medical practice by Dr. Chuck Radis was added to the collection last month. This collection of photographs zooms in to reveal exquisite detail, perfect for taking with you on the trail. River Voices describes the Presumpscot, the river we cross on the drive to Portland on Route 9. Here are essays on all aspects of the river including history, ecology, biology, and economy.

Representative from the 1st District that includes greater Portland from 1997-2009. His book is *Dangerous Convictions* in which he discusses the political polarization which he experienced in his years in Washington.

How did the serpent convince Eve to eat the apple? How many pairs of animals boarded Noah's ark? Who was that woman who snuck into a fancy dinner party to anoint Jesus? Did Caravaggio paint Paul's Damascus Road incident correctly? Who was the angel who wrestled with Jacob?

The rabbis developed a genre of imaginative interpretation to answer questions like these. They called it Midrash, meaning "to study" or "to investigate." OceanView's Dining Services and Activities have been working hard to source recyclable and or compostable products for all take-out food. This link shows all the containers OceanView uses, with a good explanation of their properties. biomasspackaging.com/brands/greenware/

Please wipe or rinse containers before recycling. Of course, when possible, bring along your own mug. eating utensils and even containers instead of using plastic, even it if is recyclable.

All **clear plastic cups** are made of a plant-fiber-based PLA (polylactic acid) Greenware®, which is recyclable (and possibly compostable.) When you place cups in the recycle bin, be sure the tops are attached to them, not loose.

All cardboard containers are recyclable and compostable.

You use them to store food waste for composting in your freezer and then place the container in a compost bin near one of OceanView's kitchens.

Recycle plastic box compartmented liners.

The stronger **clear and black plastic boxes** are recyclable and *reusable*. Wash it out and take it with you when you get take-out at the grill.

Please place all returnable beverage bottles in the containers on the 3rd floor in ML, across from the hair salon. Put any caps (plastic or metal) back on the bottles. This protects the bottles so they can be reprocessed, and keeps the tiny tops from getting caught in machinery.

Steel caps and **lids** from jars that go into recycling can be placed separated, as magnets are used to separate them from the rest.

biblical account. And they might go further, speculating, reacting, or arguing with the text. Poets do just what the rabbis did. They color in the details, give the weather report, retell the story, expand the plot line, round out the characters. They might argue with the biblical "point," or they underscore it.

All this is possible because the Bible is an "open" text. We always bring ourselves, our imaginations, and our life situations to our reading. The Bible meets us there. Merle Marie Troeger will take five well-known biblical passages and explore what several poets have to say about them. You may gain some new insights into these very familiar stories.





study, and a commitment to good works. Bobbe's love for Maine also began early. Her family summered on Southport Island, and she embraces all Maine has to offer: its amazing land and seascapes, outdoor activities, extraordinary people, and, above all, time with family.

After earning a nursing degree at Russell Sage College, Bobbe married her soulmate, Dick, a Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute graduate. They first lived in San Francisco where Dick worked for Stauffer Chemical Company. Then they moved to Fairfield, CT, where they raised their son and daughter. Over the years, Dick oversaw a variety of chemical-related businesses, and they lived in Chicago, Houston, the Netherlands, and Bedminster, NJ. But always there was Maine and their summer home on Southport Island. Finally, in 2004, Bobbe and Dick achieved their goal and permanently settled in Cape Elizabeth.

And her ever-evolving life? Bobbe's first career was as a stay-at-home mom, whose busy schedule included co-operating a part-time catering business (competing with Martha Stewart? no threat) and as a Junior League volunteer, surveying and then facilitating communication among area youth agencies to enhance their effectiveness. When her children reached their teens, Bobbe began her second career. She returned to nursing, providing homecare and hospice support via agencies in Connecticut, New Jersey, and Maine. Most memorable to Bobbe, and valued by her, was managing a clinical team that served disadvantaged people living in Bridgeport, CT's, high-rise projects, who would otherwise have had no access to healthcare. Throughout, she has continued her spiritual growth as a follower of Christ. Following Dick's death in 2022, and despite her own mobility challenges, Bobbe ("stubborn" according to her children) refuses to leave Maine, where she has found so much joy. She's brought her warm smile and compassionate spirit to OceanView, where "there's a lot more going on than bingo." Bobbe is enjoying everything the community offers.

DeCourcy (Dick) McIntosh

(Schoolhouse) had a varied career in the art and non-profit world and, thanks to friendships formed in college, had a long association with Prouts Neck before moving to OceanView in late 2023.

Dick was born in Baltimore, grew up in rural Baltimore county, attended Phillips Exeter

Academy, and then Harvard (class of 1965), where he concentrated in English and art history. After Harvard, he entered foreign-service graduate school at Georgetown University to prepare for a State Department career, but the Vietnam-era ban on overseas hiring put an end to that career plan.

While in Washington, Dick had met and married Susan Bell of Pittsburgh; with foreign service plans on hold, he and Suzy moved to Suzy's hometown. There he worked for the R. K. Mellon family office, managing aspects of that family's educational, civic, and cultural philanthropy. A daughter and son were born to the couple during this time. The daughter now lives in New York and has twin sons; the son lives in Florida.

In Pittsburgh, Dick developed an interest in historic restoration that eventually prompted a move to Savannah, where he directed the Historic Savannah Foundation. Next, the family headed to St. Paul, MN, where Dick managed the transformation of the Old Federal Courts Building into a headquarters for arts organizations. Three years later, he crossed the Mississippi to be V.P. for Development of the Minneapolis Institute of Arts.

The next career shift was to return to Pittsburgh for a 17-year stint as director of the Frick Art & Historical Center, an outgrowth of the art museum the daughter of industrialist Henry Clay Frick had established on her estate. There, Dick oversaw the restoration of the Frick mansion and the development of the estate into an active center for local history and for exhibitions of old-master and 19th century art.

In 2001, Dick shifted his focus to research and writing about the growth of art collecting in America, his research based on the vast archive of M. Knoedler & Company in New York, as well as on primary sources in France, England, and Germany.

Polly Taylor (Main Lodge) lived for most of her life in Marblehead, Massachusetts, where she enjoyed her childhood and later returned to raise her family, always sailing and spending lots of time on the water. Then she returned to Massachusetts, where Polly worked as an assistant to a graduate student in the Psychology Department at Harvard. When he completed his degree and went into business for himself, she continued as his assistant, writing teaching-machine programs (programmed instruction) for a few years.

Polly married and raised a family of three boys. Her husband, an engineer, ran a small business, so Polly became adept in small-business operations. She handled the payroll, taxes, and other things, including occasionally writing electrical test-set panels for him. Polly also took charge of a sideline product for which she developed a marketing approach and handled manufacturing. As her sons grew older, they participated, which was a great way for them to learn to earn and save money.

On the side, Polly enjoyed learning BASIC and COBOL programming languages. In her fifties, she pursued a master's degree in information systems at Northeastern University and became a software developer.

After retiring, Polly explored the United States by train and took two trips to Europe. She documented her family history, wrote a genealogy of her father's family, and pursued her favorite activities, including walking, bicycling, gardening, rowing, and sailing.
