Further, Falmouth's Conservation Commission has **proposed** a *Pesticide and Fertilizer Regulation Ordinance* to ensure the proper use of outdoor pesticides and fertilizers in the community.

Trash & Recycling Bins for Cottage Residents

Those of us who live in OceanView cottages are now required by the Town of Falmouth to use toters (one for trash and another for recyclables). This new system was met with some confusion and concern. A committee comprised of your neighbors and OceanView Management prepared a report containing finding and recommendations. Among their findings the committee learned that many residents feel the toters are too big and heavy. The Falmouth Town Manager agreed smaller toters can be made available at no cost to us. The smaller toters have a 48-gallon capacity compared to the present 64 gallons.

To help you understand the difference both sizes are



available for comparison in the Community Room of Blueberry Commons. They will be on display from now to 15th.

Cottage residents will receive a "Notice Regarding Trash Bins" next week explaining how to request smaller containers. If you want to

convert to the smaller toters, please return the form to the Front Desk in the Lodge.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REFLECTIONS

Nancy Wanderer, President

At the March Community Council meeting, we began discussing whether to extend our gratuities program to caregivers at Falmouth House and Legacy Memory Care. Although they are resident-facing, hourly employees, they have not received gratuities in the past. We also briefly discussed whether to have only one solicitation in the fall, with gratuities awarded shortly before the holidays in December. In the past, we have had two gratuities solicitations: one in the spring and another in the fall.

Naively, I had thought these changes would be welcomed by residents. Providing gratuities to caregivers who make the lives of Falmouth House and Legacy residents so much better seemed like a noncontroversial idea. I also thought residents would be happy to receive only one gratuities solicitation each year instead of two. Currently, residents are asked to contribute to the Oceanview Resident Assistance Fund once a year, in the fall, and to the gratuities collection twice a year, in the spring and again in the fall. It seemed like having one solicitation for each purpose instead of one for the OVRAF and two for gratuities would help prevent

the confusion that often arises when so many different solicitations come our way.

After I introduced those two ideas, however, I quickly discovered how wrong I was. People do have strong, differing opinions about how solicitations should be handled, so I am glad we tabled the discussion until the April meeting. At that meeting, I promise to keep the agenda to a minimum and introduce the gratuities discussion right after the staff reports are completed. The only other thing we need to accomplish at that meeting is to elect officers for 2024-2025. The nominations are Nancy Wanderer for President, Karen Thorpe for Treasurer, and Donna Knoblock for Secretary.

To allow everyone an additional opportunity to ask questions and discuss the gratuity question, Karen Thorpe will be attending "Tuesdays with Nancy" at 1:00 p.m. on April 2 in the Hilltop Lodge living room. To simplify the discussion, we have tabled the idea of having only have one gratuities solicitation per year. That will leave us with only one question to discuss and decide: whether Falmouth House and Legacy caregivers will receive gratuities going forward.

I also want to remind everyone that Community Council Meetings are scheduled to last an hour and fifteen minutes. I try to end the meeting by 4:00 p.m., but that is not always possible, especially when we have important matters to discuss. Thank you for your patience and understanding when we go a few minutes longer, as we did at the March meeting. Of course,

It must be a program that sits well with most residents. I look forward to

resolving this issue through thoughtful, civil discussion at our April meeting. Until then, if you have any questions, please contact Treasurer Karen Thorpe or me. We will be happy to answer your questions and hear your ideas. Together, I know we can figure this out.

REMINDER: The April 8th Community Council meeting will begin at **1:00 p.m.** instead of 3:00 p.m. to allow everyone to experience the eclipse that will be occurring that afternoon.

OV LIBRARY COMMITTEE

First, a couple of library rules, then some useful information.

- ⇒ Please do not bring your dog into the library. It can be annoying to library users.
- ⇒ And please **do not bring food or drink** into the library. The risk that you will leave some of it behind on the floor, the furniture, or the books is just too great. *The only exception to this rule is you may bring water* in a sealable container while playing in the Card Room.

The room at the right end of the library is called the *Media Room*. Not the room with the view, but the windowless room out the other door.

- If you are visually impaired, you might want to use the screen magnifier that is in the Media Room. It is there for you. Make an appointment with Activities to learn how to use it.
- The Media Room also contains a computer with the library catalog on it, just like in other libraries. It is very simple to look up a book, an author, or a subject, and find call numbers. Just type one or more words, but be aware that it requires correct spelling.

The books, magazines, audio books, and DVD movies in our library have all been donated by residents like you. We do not buy books. You can donate books by putting them on the workbench in the Media Room. But PLEASE read AND HEED the poster on the wall that lists what kinds of books we DO NOT WANT. Donating books we do not

want just makes extra work for the library staff in getting rid of them. This list is also in the document "Using the OceanView Library" which you can find online at the residents portal or in hardcopy next to the checkout counter in the library.

We also need more donations of magazines, as long as they are the MOST RECENT three issues and are of general interest. Older issues just make more work for the library staff as they must be recycled. Magazine donations go on the table by the magazine rack. And, if you remove a magazine from the rack, pleas do not put it back on the rack; leave it on the table.

FROM THE NEW BOOK SHELF

FICTION: We begin our list of new books with two best sellers: *The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store* by James McBride and *The Wager* by David Grann. Also in fiction, but in the **LGPR** section, are *The Final Storm* by Jeff Shaara and a 2 in1 volume, *The Mistletoe Secret* by R.P. Evans and *Triple Crown* by Felix Francis. The large prints are not new but still readable and more accessible to some of us.

NONFICTION: United States history is the topic of Nathaniel Philbrick's Valiant Ambition: George Washington and Benedict Arnold and the fate of the American Revolution. Another aspect of American history is Ned Blackhawk's The Rediscovery of America: native people and the unmaking of U.S. history. Blackhawk, a professor at Yale, interweaves native and non-native histories.

Topics farther from home are *China Road: a journey into the future of a rising power* by Rob Gifford. Gifford traveled Rte. 312 which connects Shanghai to Kazakhstan. I'm going to caution that this book was published in 2006, so it's not up to date. However, it sets the stage and illuminates the dramatic rise of China as an economic and political giant, telling the tale through Gifford's conversations with the many people he met on his long journey. *River of the Gods* is about the quest for the source of the Nile. The author is Candice Millard, respected writer and historian of other bestselling books about the assassination of President Garfield and early life of Theodore Roosevelt.

the "bonsai guitar" and a menagerie of voices in a
collision of post-punk performance and toe-tapping

oldies – with no drums, pianos, backing tracks or banjos, no pitch shifters or electronic trickery – their joyous concerts are a revelation of the rich palette of orchestration afforded by ukuleles and singing (and a bit of whistling). 

April Tip:

Let's think about the different ways we use energy and the different sources.

When we lost our power at the end of March, this affects us in different ways. Those hardest hit in the oldest Main Lodge apartments use electric heat and hot-water, so we had neither. Others in the Lodge's had access to these through the common sourcing, and those in cottages had their noisy generators. So all-electric lost out. On the other hand, the generators were incredibly noisy, and, unfortunately, producing CO2 while burning natural gas to keep you warm.

Some of us have gas fireplaces and stoves, which also burn gas, rather than the wood we use at camp. Combustion generates CO2, but at least wood at camp is a somewhat renewable source.

We drive cars that use gasoline, or maybe electricity or a mix in a hybrid.

And the electricity we use from CMP comes from a variety of sources, hydropower from dammed up rivers (some of which hinder normal fish spawning,) power generated by burning our trash in EcoMaine's large incinerator, wind or solar that neighbors don't want.

No matter what kind of energy we use, there are drawbacks. We need heat and electricity to run our lives. What is the best source of energy then, not only for our lives, but for the next generations? Can we learn to need less energy by insulating better and using more energy efficient appliances?

Van - The Maine Jewish Museum Exhibit "Father and Daughter: William Zorach and Dahlov Ipcar"

Mon., 4/1, 1:30p

As a sculptor in the United States, William Zorach pioneered the art of direct carving stones. He preferred direct carving granite boulders, which he often found himself on walks. There is a spirituality to Zorach's sculptures inspired by the stones he used and they are uniquely expressive – largely conveying love, strength and inner peace. Zorach was very thoughtful and articulate about his work.

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Many of these direct carved sculptures in stone and wood were cast in bronze. In this exhibition, guest curated by Rachel Walls, seven (7) works in bronze created between 1949 and 1956 will be shown together for the first time. These bronzes – Battle of the Ghetto, Refugees, Their Annihilation, Sacrifice, The Prayer, Samuel Answers the Lord and Head of Moses (pictured) – are deeply personal works Zorach created as he processed his own reaction to the Holocaust in Europe and World War II. Dahlov (Zorach) Ipcar is considered her parents' greatest creative experiment. Ipcar was born at a hospital in Windsor, Vermont to the famed sculptor, painter and educator William Zorach and his wife, the painter and textile artist Marguerite (Thompson) Zorach in 1917, while they were living at Echo Farm in Plainfield, New Hampshire.

Ipcar describes her childhood as unusual, "I grew up in a home full of modern art, of Fauvism and Cubism, in a creative atmosphere, where everything in our home was exciting and different from other people's homes. From the beginning, art seemed like a natural part of life."

In the late 1930s after marrying Adolph Ipcar, a longtime friend and summer neighbor in Maine, PLEASE SIGN UP in New York City, the newlywed Ipcars moved **FOR ACTIVITIES** to Maine permanently where they lived on & WEAR YOUR Robinhood Farm, part of the Zorach's property on Georgetown Island, Maine. Over twenty works from Ipcar's personal collection, the majority of which were created in her studio and later hung in her residence on Robinhood Farm will be shown in this exhibition.

The Maine Jewish Museum is housed within the restored Etz Chaim Synagogue, a turn-of-the-century house of worship. The museum is a venue for contemporary art exhibits feature established, Jewishconnected, and Maine-connected artists and rotate every eight weeks.


