FROM THE NEW BOOKS SHELF

New to **FICTION** this month is *The Mighty Red*, i.e., the Red River Valley, by Louise Erdrich; *In the Woods* by Tana French, the first of her very popular thrillers; and *The Rachel Incident* by Caroline O'Donoghue. *Rachel* was a TIME and NPR Book of the Year and USA Today bestseller, WOW! Our classic novel is *All the King's Men* by Robert Penn Warren.

In **NONFICTION**, we've added two books of essays. David Remnick has written *Holding the Note* which features essays on musicians including Aretha Franklin,

Paul McCartney, Keith Richards, and Bruce Springsteen. The other book of essays, *The Art of the* Myth, is in the MAINE COLLECTION. These are a collection of columns by Michael Burke which originally appeared in Down East and Yankee magazines. New to the library is Rin Tin Tin by Susan Orlean. Orlean finds unique approaches to important subjects, i.e., Saturday Night about how Americans spend their Saturday nights; and Orchid Thief which revealed loopholes in rare species law; and *The Library Book* about the function and use of libraries through a case of arson. Her writing is captivating; I wonder what broader issue Rin Tin Tin will reveal. When Women Ran 5th Avenue by Julie Satow is about the women who ran Bonwit Teller, Lord & Taylor and Henri Bendel. A timely subject as I write this is *Vatican Spies* by Yvonnick Denoel. It promises to uncover entertaining incidents of Vatican 'moles', secret negotiations and other various intrigues. Readers of Heather Cox Richardson's daily column may enjoy *Democracy* Awakening. Finally, in **BIOGRAPHY**, is Katie Couric's *Going There*. It looks as engaging, optimistic and fun loving as its author.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REFLECTIONS

Nancy Wanderer, President Some people believe in angels, signs, and miracles. Others rely almost entirely on rationality and science. All my life, I have

believed in everything: angels, signs, miracles, rationality, and science. Sometimes, things have happened to me that made sense, like enjoying the success that came from being an honest, hardworking, reliable person. Other times, life threw me a curve ball that seemed to make no sense at all in the most heartbreaking way, like when my baby was born with a heart defect and lived only three days. At age 25, I learned the difficult lesson that things will not always work out, no matter how good you are, no matter how hard you try, no matter what you do.

This year, life has thrown us all some curve balls. Our financial foundation seems to be crumbling, even as we are relying more and more on our retirement accounts and investments. Our children and grandchildren are being fired from their jobs in the federal government through no fault of their own. Funding for vital medical research is being slashed. Vaccines for diseases we thought had been eradicated like polio are being disparaged. Universities and law firms are being attacked. Medicaid is on the chopping block. How do we carry on in times like these? What can we believe in? In answer to these monumental questions, I offer a simple story that is giving me hope today. The

subject of the story—a lost car key—is inconsequential when compared to the disasters I listed above. Nevertheless, what happened with that car key is giving me the hope I need to carry on.

A few weeks ago, Susan and I had dinner with friends. We drove to their OceanView cottage with the key safely tucked in my pocket. The next day, we went to church and then to Fieldstone Gardens in China, Maine. The day after that, when I reached for my key on the little rack by the door, I was stunned to find it gone. For the next two weeks, Susan and I searched high and low for that key. We knew it had to be in our house because we used it to drive home, but where could it go? The following few weeks were filled with matters more important than that key. I had thoracic surgery in Boston for suspected lung cancer. Luckily, the mass in my lung turned out to be the product of an infection, not cancer. We celebrated that news after the surgery and yesterday when we drove to Boston for my post-op appointment, where I was declared to be in fine shape. On the way home from the doctor's office, I needed some lip gloss and dug into my backpack, a backpack I rarely use anymore because I have such deep pockets in all my pants. While digging around in the bottom of the backpack, I saw what I thought, at first, was an apparition. Attached to a hook was the missing key. It took me a moment to accept that I wasn't seeing things. I had found the missing key!

Was finding the key a miracle? Could I have found it through rational thinking if I could have just retraced my steps a few weeks before? Were there angels protecting me from cancer and lost keys? I can't answer these questions, but I am taking to heart what I learned from this experience. We can't always know what will happen, no matter how much rationality we bring to a situation. The most important thing is to resist despair and continue to hope for a miracle, if that's what it takes, to address the potential disasters we face. An hour, day, week, or month from now, my son and his partner might have new jobs and be able afford tuition for our grandson when he starts college in the fall. Republicans in Congress might join with Democrats to put an end to the devastation in Washington. The power of the people might force our government to prioritize the environment, health care, and protection for marginalized people. Finding my keys, when I had almost given up thinking I would ever see them again, has taught me to hope all this could happen. I hope this story will have the same effect on you.



WISE Zambia —Women's Initiatives that Strengthen and Empower

Initially formed as an NGO by women living in a remote corner of Zambia in 2004, WISE Zambia's mission is to promote self-sustaining lives for vulnerable women and children in Zambia's Western Province. Under the direction of local leaders, the

program provides educational support and agricultural and entrepreneurial training throughout the region. The project grew out of a Habitat for Humanity "build" with people from Maine and now has NGO

Writer, traveler, hiker, and volunteer Miriam Congdon (Blueberry Commons) brings a wealth of life experiences to OceanView. While she was growing up in the Boston area, her high school English teacher encouraged her to write. After graduating from Brandeis University and acquiring some career experience at Har-



vard, Miriam moved to Washington, DC, where she worked for Congressman Alphonzo Bell, answering constituent letters and writing speeches and newsletters. At a party, Miriam met her future husband, Don, also a Congressional staffer. During the Vietnam War, Don enlisted, received Army Intelligence training, and was posted to Oberammergau in the Bavarian Alps, where the Congdons' daughter, Deborah, was born. After Don began working at AT&T in Atlanta, GA, Miriam took a job on Jimmy Carter's paid campaign staff. She answered letters from key Democrats as well as old friends from Plains. At one point, the Carters needed to send daughter Amy home from a campaign trip, so Miriam and Deborah met Amy at the airport and effected the transfer to her grandmother, Miss Lillian. After Don moved to AT&T in New Jersey, Miriam worked as a freelance writer. She was active in the Morristown Unitarian Church and volunteered in the chaplain's office of the regional hospital, where she found immense satisfaction in helping a diverse population of patients.

Given the opportunity to open a new AT&T office in New Zealand, Don and Miriam lived there for three years, learning to avoid sheep in the road as they drove. They hiked regularly with a group of New Zealanders and traveled widely in Asia.

Next stop: AT&T Belgium. For seven years, the Congdons traveled and hiked throughout Europe. Miriam volunteered on an English-language help line set up by the British to answer expat questions ranging from availability of familiar foods to suicide prevention. In 2004, shortly after their return to Morristown, Don died. In 2010, Miriam relocated to Scarborough, ME, and became active in OLLI. She enjoys being near her daughter and granddaughter, both psychotherapists based in greater Portland. Throughout her life, Miriam has continued to write short stories and poems. (NS, 5/2025)
