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

Second Chance Gift Shop

The Second Chance Gift Shop is one of the many meaningful volunteer opportunities available to OceanView and Cumberland Crossing residents. It is a unique initiative located right here on campus.

The shop was born from the desire to continue, on a smaller scale, the tradition of selling donated items from past and present residents. Years ago, our community held a large annual yard sale that featured everything from home goods and artwork to jewelry and furniture. While these events were successful and well-loved, they proved to be a massive organizational feat—requiring significant effort in terms of storage, pricing, setup, teardown, and logistics. Over time, the scale of the event became unsustainable, and concerns about public access—especially during COVID—added to the challenge.

In response, the Second Chance Gift Shop emerged as a thoughtful and sustainable alternative. It reimagines the way we repurpose and resell cherished possessions, keeping the spirit of the original yard sales alive while better aligning with the needs and capabilities of our community.

The shop operates thanks to a dedicated volunteer committee, who organize monthly sales and maintain a permanent display of items outside The Gazebo Grille—a favorite lunch spot in the Main Lodge. These sales offer residents, staff, and visitors the opportunity to find one-of-a-kind treasures for themselves or loved ones. We're excited to announce that once the Blueberry Commons Expansion is complete, the shop will have a permanent home of its own!

Originally, proceeds from the shop were donated to different charities each quarter, including our very own OceanView Resident Assistance Fund (OVRAF), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that supports residents in need of financial assistance. Today, sales proceeds are shared between the OVRAF and the Employee Gift Fund, which residents contribute to twice a year. This fund is distributed among our hourly, frontline staff as a token of appreciation, in keeping with our "no gratuity" policy.

While the shop no longer resells furniture, highquality pieces are often donated to Furniture Friends, a local nonprofit that provides furniture to "New Mainers" settling into homes.

New committee members are always welcome! The shop continues to thrive thanks to volunteers who bring fresh energy and commitment to this mission of giving back—through the thoughtful repurposing of once-beloved belongings.

We are deeply grateful to the volunteers who have made the Second Chance Gift Shop a sustainable and heartfelt success for our entire community.

Terry and Ruth Moore (Schoolhouse) agree they have never been bored. After moving 39 times in 58 years, traveling to so many different countries, and having so many adventures, they can't keep them all straight.

Ruth was born in a small town in the Finger Lakes region of New York. Terry moved to the area in sixth grade. They started dating in high school and decided early on they wanted to leave upstate New York for the wider world. When Ruth was accepted at Alfred State College in 1964, Terry decided he would go there, too. Terry majored in Measurement Science and Automation, Ruth in Sales and Marketing.

After college, Terry and Ruth married, and Terry got a job in Cleveland with Baily Meter Company. From Cleveland, they moved to California and then to Phoenix where Terry worked for Honeywell and Emerson. In 1982, Terry asked Ruth if she would like to live in Singapore. Although Ruth knew nothing about Singapore, she immediately said "yes." For the rest of Terry's long and successful career managing sales and engineering teams, he traveled extensively in Asia and Latin America. The couple has lived in Singapore and Shanghai, interspersed with postings around the States.

While Terry traveled for his work, Ruth found different jobs and volunteer positions. She worked in retail, banking, office management, and even a candle factory. While living overseas, Ruth volunteered with expat groups and traveled widely on her own, without a cell phone.

The Moores have vacationed everywhere from Africa to the Galapagos Islands and many places in between. Terry, a past runner and current hiker, has run and hiked Rim to Rim of the Grand Canyon 16 times.

In 2004, when Terry retired, the Moores moved from Austin, TX, to Chandler's Wharf in Portland. However, Terry failed retirement, so they headed back to Austin for another job. In 2010, Terry really retired, and the Moores lived between Maine, where they have family, and Arizona for the next several years, finally ending up at OceanView. Writer, traveler, hiker, and volunteer **Miriam Congdon** (Blueberry Commons) brings a wealth of life experiences to OceanView. While she was growing up in the Boston area, her high school English teacher encouraged her to write. After graduating

from Brandeis University and acquiring some career experience at Harvard, Miriam moved to Washington, DC, where she worked for Congressman Alphonzo Bell, answering constituent letters and writing speeches and newsletters. At a party, Miriam met her future husband, Don, also a Congressional staffer. During the Vietnam War, Don enlisted, received Army Intelligence training, and was posted to Oberammergau in the Bavarian Alps, where the Congdons' daughter, Deborah, was born.

After Don began working at AT&T in Atlanta, GA, Miriam took a job on Jimmy Carter's paid campaign staff. She answered letters from key Democrats as well as old friends from Plains. At one point, the Carters needed to send daughter Amy home from a campaign trip, so Miriam and Deborah met Amy at the airport and effected the

transfer to her grandmother, Miss Lillian.

After Don moved to AT&T in New Jersey, Miriam worked as a freelance writer. She was active in the Morristown Unitarian Church and volunteered in the chaplain's office of the regional hospital, where she found immense satisfaction in helping a diverse population of patients.

Given the opportunity to open a new AT&T office in New Zealand, Don and Miriam lived there for three years, learning to avoid sheep in the road as they drove. They hiked regularly with a group of New Zealanders and traveled widely in Asia.

Next stop: AT&T Belgium. For seven years, the Congdons traveled and hiked throughout Europe. Miriam volunteered on an English-language help line set up by the British to answer expat questions ranging from availability of familiar foods to suicide prevention.

In 2004, shortly after their return to Morristown, Don died. In 2010, Miriam relocated to Scarborough, ME, and became active in OLLI. She enjoys being near her daughter and granddaughter, both psychotherapists based in greater Portland. Throughout her life, Miriam has continued to write short stories and poems. (NS, 5/2025)



Someone asked Roger
Rossen (Cumberland
Crossing), "After living
in Houston, Texas, for
nearly 60 years, whatever
prompted you to move
to Maine?" The answer,
of course, is family. After
medical school, he interned
at Columbia University's

Presbyterian Hospital. That choice was influenced by marriage to "a charming English gal," who had sheltered with her mother's family in New York and Maine during WWII. Their August vacations introduced him to the delights of the Maine coast.

When he landed a fellowship with the National Institutes of Health, they moved to Bethesda and began a family. His three years at the NIH were exciting and productive, providing opportunities to work with inspired people, learning about and investigating the immune system.

Following his fellowship, Roger chose to join Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, expecting to continue studying the immune system's response to respiratory infections. But his new colleagues, led by heart surgeons Drs. Denton Cooley and Michael DeBakey, were starting a heart transplant program, and demanded their help to control the aggressive immunological responses these organs elicit. Managing heart transplant rejection proved more difficult than kidney transplant rejection even after they developed novel treatments. But they learned much about the immune system's methods of attack and, particularly, why damaged heart cells provoke and are exquisitely susceptible to immunological injury. Thus began his academic career odyssey.

With funding by the NIH and the Department of Veterans Affairs, plus the hard work of inventive grad-students, post-doctoral fellows, and technical staff, his laboratory investigated the genetic control and consequences of immune system activation in cardiovascular disease, cancer, and infectious and autoimmune diseases. This new era of immunologic discovery led to the development of new vaccines, better control of allergic and immunodeficiency diseases, asthma, and cancerous malignancies. Engaging in courses to teach medical and graduate students and clinics to help people manage their allergic and other immunological diseases was exciting. Then, one day, he realized that he had recruited his successors, and his sons had their own careers; indeed, two had moved to Portland, Maine. It was time to leave the humid Gulf Coast with its 107-degree hot summer days. (BH, 2/2025)

NEW CONSTRUCTION

Every day, we grow closer to completing 37 new apartments and cottages here at OceanView!

Since breaking ground earlier this year, construction crews are making excellent progress on both sides of Blueberry Lane in the Blueberry Commons Expansion and the new Evergreen Commons neighborhood.

Construction in Evergreen Commons began with Building C, and this is where we have seen the most visible progress. From a bare foundation to a now visible two-story structure, Building C looks more complete by the day! Nearby, construction on Building B has also begun.

Construction also continues at the Blueberry Commons Expansion, which includes work on an expanded community room, lounge area, the Second Chance Gift Shop, and more.

When completed, the expansion will add 14 new apartments to Blueberry Commons. Evergreen Commons will eventually include 20 new homes in three apartment-style buildings and three cottages in a triplex configuration for a total of 37 new solar-powered homes across both projects.

Additionally, in August, the Town of Falmouth paved parts of Blueberry Lane to add new parking spaces to our campus.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

Just six miles down the road, construction is well underway in Phase 2 of Cumberland Crossing.

As of early August, 76 cottages are completed of the planned 105-cottage community—that's 53 cottages in the completed Phase 1 and 23 completed in Phase 2 with another 29 cottages at various stages of construction. On average, about a dozen cottages are under construction at any given time.

It's amazing to see the evolution of Cumberland Crossing! And that includes the people.

The first residents moved into Cumberland Crossing in 2019. Now, this vibrant neighborhood boasts more than 115 friendly neighbors, and the community has really taken on a life of its own. In the last 5+ years, our residents have formed an array of new social clubs, annual parties, and wonderful traditions.

As Phase 2 construction progresses, Little
Acres Drive, which runs all through the heart of
Cumberland Crossing, will soon have paved road
access from Tuttle Road all the way to Northwind

"When is it time for memory care?"

Transitioning from assisted living to a dedicated memory care setting, like from **Falmouth House** to **Legacy Memory Care** here at OceanView, is a significant step for residents and their families who are dealing with any level of dementia, and it can be a difficult decision to make the move to memory care. To know when the time is right, here is some information to help guide your decision.

Signs It May Be Time for Memory Care

1. Increased Memory Loss or Confusion

- Frequently getting lost, even in familiar surroundings
- Repeating questions or statements
- Difficulty recognizing danger or displaying poor judgment (e.g., unsafe microwave use)

2. Safety Concerns

- Wandering or attempting to leave home unassisted
- Increased risk of falls or accidents due to decreased awareness or cognition

3. Struggles with Activities of Daily Living

- Needing more help than assisted living can safely provide for dressing, bathing, eating, or toileting
- Frequent or unmanaged incontinence

4. Behavioral or Psychological Changes

- Heightened anxiety, agitation, or suspiciousness
- Sundowning: confusion or agitation during the late afternoon or evening
- Withdrawing socially or showing signs of depression
